Thirteen-year-old Brian Robeson is on his way to visit his father when the single-engine plane in which he is flying crashes. Suddenly, Brian finds himself alone in the Canadian wilderness with nothing but a tattered Windbreaker and the hatchet his mother gave him as a present—and the dreadful secret that has been tearing him apart since his parent's divorce. But now Brian has no time for anger, self-pity, or despair—it will take all his know-how and determination, and more courage than he knew he possessed, to survive.

Scholastic Summer Reading Challenge for Grades 6, 7, and 8

In addition to the required summer reading, middle schoolers have an opportunity to participate in the Scholastic Read-A-Palooza Summer Reading Challenge. It's easy, fun, and rewarding. Students can log their reading minutes between May 6 and September 6 to help us try to earn "Best In State" for reading minutes.

Each student has an accounts set up for the program. Go to digital.scholastic.com and enter the username and password to gain access to the minute tracker, videos, book excerpts, printable book lists and reading logs, and badges.

This year, the Summer Reading Give Back is a great new feature that meshes perfectly with Archbishop Neale School's dedication to serving others. As kids reach designated minute milestones in the Summer Reading Challenge, they unlock book donations from Scholastic and United Way to kids with limited or no access to books. Once all participants' minutes combine to reach three different minute milestones, they get 200,000 books into the hands of kids in needs. We've already hit the 25 million minutes milestone. At 50 million minutes and 100 million minutes, more books will be donated. And our kids can help make that happen!

There's a potential reward for each student (in addition to the knowledge and skill gained by doing the summer reading). Everyone who earns at least nine of the Summer Reading Challenge badges can print of his/her badge sheet and bring it to school the week of September 9 to be rewarded with a Chick-fil-a Be Our Guest card!

Change at least one key event to write an alternative ending to the story.
<input type="checkbox"/> New in Class Think about one of the characters in your novel who may have a difficult time making friends. Imagine that this character is a new student in our class. Write about what you might do to help this person feel comfortable.	<input type="checkbox"/> Acrostic Poem Make an acrostic poem out of the title of your novel. Use the letters to give a summary of the reading to complete the poem.	<input type="checkbox"/> Test Create a 5 to 10 question comprehension test for your novel. Include an answer key on a separate piece of paper.

On the poster, place the character in his or her setting, and surround the character with elements from the story. The poster should be no larger than 8 ½ x 11" (regular computer paper is fine!)	<input type="checkbox"/> Conflicts A main character in your novel struggles with something that they may not be able to change. Write about a struggle you or someone close to you has or has had and explain how they would deal with it.	<input type="checkbox"/> In the future? Do you think that this story could take place one hundred years from now? Why or why not? Explain your reasons in 1-2 full paragraphs.
